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Eugene Saari was born June 21, 1909 in the small mining community of Chisolm, Minnesota, where his father worked as an iron miner. After the Western Federation of Miners failed in its attempt to unionize Mesabi Range miners, the elder Saari moved the family to a homestead farm on Sugar Island, near Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan. At the age of fifteen, to supplement the meager family income, Gene took a job in an auto plant in Wayne, Michigan, later working on Great Lakes iron ore carriers and in lumber camps and other auto factories.

He began his union activities in 1937, helping to organize Cadillac workers for the UAW. While working for the Timber & Sawmill Workers Union Local 15 in 1940, he helped arrange the transfer of the fledgling CIO local representing miners at Copper Range Co. into the International Union of Mine, Mill & Smelter Workers. United Copper Workers Union Local 494, which he served as secretary-treasurer, was the first local union organized in the Michigan nonferrous fields since the 1913 Western Federation of Miners strike.

As a Michigan State CIO vice-president and Mine-Mill international representative, Mr. Saari was instrumental in bringing Quincy, Isle Royale and Calumet and Hecla miners as well as UP limestone and explosives workers into the union. In 1950 he left the IUMMSW for the United Steelworkers of America where he helped organize the campaigns that brought these locals into the Steelworkers union. He continued to organize and service UP copper locals as an international representative for the Steelworkers in the 1950s and 1960s. Gene Saari died April 7, 1990.

The Gene Saari Collection contains correspondence, reports, grievance and contract negotiations files, newspaper clippings, publications and other documents related to labor organizing, collective bargaining and strikes in the Michigan copper industry, to jurisdictional disputes between Mine-Mill and the Steelworkers union, to economic and social conditions in Michigan's Upper Peninsula, and to Mr. Saari's campaigns for public office in the 1940s.
